

Battle Brief: How George Washington Started the French and Indian War National Museum of the United States Army July 13, 12:00pm-1:00pm (Virtual Event)

In the vast frontier woods of what was called "the Ohio Country," a young, inexperienced Virginia provincial officer named George Washington set off a series of events in 1754 that would soon set off the wide-scale conflict called the French and Indian War in America, and the Seven Years' War in Europe. Based at a crude log fort called Fort Necessity in today's western Pennsylvania, Colonel Washington led a small detachment of soldiers in search of suspected French spies in May. The ensuing skirmish that pitted the Virginians and their Indian allies against colonial French troops ended in bloodshed, further violence that summer, and eventually to an all out imperial war engulfing Great Britain, France, Spain, American colonists, and Native Americans. Join the National Museum of the United States Army's Elizabeth Maurer, Chief of Programs and Education, in a virtual, one hour presentation exploring George Washington's first command, his initiation into warfare, and decisions he took that sparked a world war.

James Butler "Wild Bill" Hickok
(May 27, 1837 - August 2, 1876)

PETER ESPADA





Peter finished a Nike Hercules surface-toair missile system of the 1950's and 1960's from the recently-issued Atlantis (ex-Revell) kit. This two-stage missile was principally designed to bring down Soviet bomber fleets by exploding up to a 40 kiloton nuclear warhead in their midst.

Peter says the kit itself is very nice in spite of the molds being around 64 years old. It required a lot of fine fitting to get the parts to "settle" together, but it was better than most kits of this age. "And I got the elevation mechanism to work, too! Not many kids can brag about that."

The puzzle for Peter was, what was the three-man crew supposed to be doing, exactly? One soldier holding a phone receiver, the other two waiting for bad news, perhaps? In addition, he could not find a single picture of a Nike Hercules with the emblems and lighting bolt painted on the booster stage, so he left them off. This paint scheme looks more like the ones he saw in pictures he found online. "A fun build."

MICHAEL DUTCHER

Lord of Gluttony, Games Workshop. This is one of the commission pieces that Mike has been working on. These pieces are between 28mm and 32mm in scale. He said he learned a lot about himself as a painter and modeler and that he is not a vehicle painter. He said he wasn't real happy with representing the marble, but a great exercise. Painted in acrylics, he gave an overcoat of Vallejo satin to keep marble and metallics shiny.

Meeting attendees were impressed that Mike was able to complete this complicated kit in about a month's time.













MICHAEL DUTCHER

(CONTINUED)

Sigvald The Magnificent, Games Workshop (left) Another commission that Mike said was a lot of fun to paint. Painted in acrylics and a good practice with metallics. He said he spent about 30 hours on it with about 20 hours spent on the face. Mike said that he's supposed to be magnificent so he wanted to make him as pretty as possible.

King of the Jungle (below) Reaper Miniatures Bones Black series. Mike said one of his kid's favorite books was "Elmer the Patchwork Elephant," so he's going to paint this one as Elmer the Patchwork Elephant all grown up. Mike said he hopes to take this to ReaperCon in September. Painted in acrylics.

MICHAEL DUTCHER (CONTINUED)

Launcelot (below) Masters Edition—Demented Games. It's a WIP. Mike says he's experimenting with the non-metallic metal painting technique. He's made progress, but using this technique has been a lot of work since he's painting copper, brass, and silver.







Skadi Wavesplitter, Reaper Miniatures. This will be a beach scene diorama. Mike plans on having UV resin water spilling from the cut champaign glass. The trees are 3-D printed off of Etsy and he wasn't sure where he got the barrels from. The surface of the figure was really rough and pitted, so he used Mr. Hobby's Mr. Surfacer 1200 to prime. Mike said he was impressed with the product. He'll be painting it in acrylics.

RICK SANDERS

28mm Heinrichsen "group" figure: 1386 Battle of Sempach, where according to legend, the Swiss soldier Winkelried sacrificed himself by gathering the lance heads to his chest, thus causing a breach in the Austrian line. This allowed the Swiss to penetrate the enemy's formation and to defeat the Austrians. This figure was designed and engraved in 1891 - so 130 years ago! (Front and rear painted, as Rick does consistently.)





Heinrichsen 28mm "group figure": **1444 Battle of St. Jakob an der Birs** (Switzerland), with Swiss against the Austrians. Left to right the flags are cantons of Bern, Lucerne, Glarus and Uri. The figure was designed and the mold engraved in 1895-96.

MICHAEL PIERCE

On the right is a Rubin Squadron Napoleonic Lancer, around 58 mm that has been modified with Historex parts and putty for a new plume, new arms, a new face (Mike's first time sculpting a face). The braiding and piping is also sculpted.

The second figure is of unknown origin. Mike modified it to be from Butler's Rangers, a Loyalist Group in the American Revolutionary War. The head is Historex, the hands and canteen are from Airfix, and the Brown Bess musket is from Michael Roberts. The figure is holding a Tamiya rabbit. Mike said he also sculpted the arms.







BRIAN NICKLAS

On the right is a 1/8 Aurora "USAF Pilot" aka "Steve Canyon" that he rebuilt from a model originally built circa 1958 (NOT by Brian) and loaned from a friend. He took it apart into major subassemblies, stripped the paint, reassembled, primed then painted with enamels, oils and acrylics. For the visor Brian used a Chrome Marker Pen, then added some Tamiya Transparent Green.

Below is a 1/8 Moebius "Piscine Amphibious Humanoid" aka "The Creature from the Black Lagoon" painted with a mix of enamels and acrylics. The original Aurora kit had raised arms holding a woman, this re-issue had resin arms. Brian studied various reptiles to get the final painting done realistically. He used Future Floorwax to get a wet effect with the beach sand.

Finally, a 1/8 Moebius "The Grim Reaper" a Work in Progress which Brian will modify to match the death dealer in Monty Python's The Meaning of Life, with appropriate gravestones added.









NICK STROCCHIA

This is the second Gundam for Nick's Nam Gundam diorama. He obtained some appropriate 144 scale Willy's jeeps for storage in his backpack and tried out MIG weathering enamels, which he enjoyed using.














NICK STROCCHIA (CONTINUED)

Nick did this project for a friend who used to work at a Starbuck's and told him it was one of his favorite jobs. These kits are mixed media with plastic and wood, and are either HO or N Scale. A very fun project that only took him about 10-12 hours. He may do a 7-11 next!









MIKE THOMAS

Miles, Legio XI on the march, 1st century AD, 1/9th (250mm). From Medieval Forge Miniatures (via El Greco Miniatures)

Mike did a great review of this kit in our January Dispatch. He mentioned there are not too many kits depicting Legionaries in marching order with equipment. This is a huge figure and wouldn't fit in his case. He suggested that it might have been better to leave off a lot of the bottom half.









MIKE THOMAS (CONTINUED)

A young Miniatures Bust in 1/10 scale labeled as a Signifer, which is not what he is carrying. Mike did a nice review of this bust in the May issue and speculates he could be an Imago carrying an image of a deity.










MIKE THOMAS (CONTINUED)

A classic David Grieve 70mm figure of a Guards Heavy Camel Regiment (Gordon Relief Expedition, 1882, Sudan War). This figure is quite old (as figures go), possibly as much as a 30-year veteran. Owned by a friend, he painted it for him in exchange for a bottle of Whiskey, Welsh of course.









DAVID HOFFMAN

Young Miniatures Roman cavalryman, 3rd Century CE. 1/10 Scale and Nuts Planet Hannibal Barca, Second Punic War. David did these in tandem as having similar aspects such as animal pelts and Bronze armor, where he used Vallejo Liquid Gold, an alcohol based paint that will actually rust if thinned with anything besides Isopropyl alcohol. The rest is painted with oils.

Genghis Khan, Pegaso 200mm. David used a Vallejo Basecoat, Gunze Sangyo Mr. Metal for the lamellar armor, and Vallejo Brass/Gold for the yellow metal, Jo Sonja's Acrylics for embroidery, the rest painted in oils. He studied photos of golden eagles very closely before painting.













ROBERT HUETTNER



To the left is a completed Sir William Wallace by FeR. Bob said this kit came with two head options (neither were Mel Gibson!). He said the "Lion Rampant" on his chest and shield were quite a challenge, but everyone agreed they came out very well. Great work on the armor and Bob mentioned he used various shades of aluminum paint, buffed wit graphite and weathered with oil washes.

Max Wünsche is in progress from a Dog Tag Models special edition kit of only 50 made. Some fit issues for the commander and Bob is experimenting with the hairspray technique for the Tiger 1 Commander's Cupola.



THE TIMES Turner masterpiece to whip

seascape that raised the renown of JMW Turner as a great maritime artist goes on public display in New York today for the first time in more than 75 years.

Purfleet and the Essex Shore as seen from Long Reach pitches the viewer into the mouth of the Thames during the Napoleonic Wars. It was one of a series of paintings that caused a sensation when first shown at Turner's own gallery in Harley Street between 1807 and 1809.

"There were originally nine of these Thames estuary seascapes," Julian Gascoigne, a director in the old masters department at Sotheby's, said. "One was destroyed in the Second World War."

Six are hanging in national galleries and museums. "Only two are left in private ands and this is one," he added.

The work was bought by the Earl of Essex in 1808 and acquired by a collector in Philadelphia at the end of that century, then by another in New Jersey. It last appeared in public at Christie's in London in June 1945, when it was sold to its present owner. Gascoigne said that a European family had kept it in their home. Southeby's expects it to sell for up to £6 million in London on July 7. Gascoigne said "that was a relatively conservative esti-

mate" because so few Turners came on the market. Turner ensured some of this scarcity himself, buying back many of his works and keeping others in his studio, intending to bequeath the lot to the nation.

Franco-Prussian War 1870/71

Uniforms and Equipment of the German and French Armies

by Markus Stein & Gerhard Bauer (volume 1) Louis Delpérier, Laurent Mirouze & Christophe Pommier (volume 2) 800 pp, Verlag Militaria, 2020

About the Book (from the publisher)

The German Armies (Volume 1): ..."The war of 1870/71 began disappearing from public consciousness in Germany even before 1945. What remain today are at best vague ideas of colourful, harmless battles and the name Otto von Bismarck. Forgotten, however, are not only the real suffering by the soldiers of both sides and the civilian population, but also knowledge about the appearance of the two opposing armies. In the Franco-Prussian War, German armies for the last time fought in different uniforms and, contrary to popular opinion, did not form a 'universal' army of spiked helmets. As the German armies continued wearing their uniforms after the

war ended, more trophies from this war made their way into museums than contemporary German uniforms and pieces of equipment. In this volume, therefore, it is not just the original pieces held in public and private collections that are illustrated and described. They are combined with historical photographs, paintings and images to create for the first time a comprehensive compendium concerning the organisation and uniforms of the German field armies of the war of 1870-71. It is complemented by a book about the French armies of the Empire and the Republic."


"More than just highly recommended."

The French Armies (Volume 2): "Although it is less obvious than in Germany, since the two World Wars the conflict of 1870 has largely been forgotten in France. However, few events have been more decisive in the history of this country...

...With the help of collec-



tions that, despite the richness of [France's] national heritage, have often been difficult to present, this book aims to revive the incredible diversity of the French armies of 1870. This diversity is illustrated in the ranks of the imperial army defeated during that summer, with the Imperial Guard, its elite regiments and the units of the African army. It is also visible in the regiments de Marche (provisional), Mobiles, National Guards and Francs-Tireurs, that is to say the armies of the National Defence, which continued the war during the republican phase of the conflict. Ultimately, the uniforms, equipment, paintings and

photographs presented in this work make it possible to examine more closely the soldier's daily life, the prevalent military values, the ideas of the time, and undoubtedly also a part of France's national identity."

Critical Review

With a set of reference books such as this, the absence of book reviews online is not surprising. Aside from the publisher's description of the set, I was able to find one PlanetFigure forum thread discussing the books. The original poster described the books as, "More than just highly recommended." Several people commented that the set looked to be beautifully done and that they wanted it for their birthday. A few com-

mented on the price and the weight of the books.

I purchased the set directly from Berliner Zinnfiguren for 121,40€ (~ \$146.94) which, considering the amazing quality of the books, did not seem overly expensive. However, the postage was a bit of an unplanned expense at 83,99€ (~\$101.66) I quickly forgot the total price when I began flipping through 12 pounds(!) worth of the pages. (Yes, it's that heavy.)

First Impressions

The uniforms of both the French and Prussians are presented in beautiful detail with museum quality closeups, along with some nice photos of arms and equipment. Each volume has a concise history of the war,

one from the German point of view and one from the French, appropriately. It is also interspersed with some great artwork from Detaille, de Neuville, etc.

If you're the least bit interested in Franco-Prussian War uniforms, this book is a treasure and one of the best I have seen depicting any era, including the Napoleonic.
















For the modeler interested in the Franco-Prussian War (July 1870 to January 1871), there are many kits out there to choose from. It was a very colorful period with distinguishing uniforms for many different types of formations, ranging from colorful French Zouaves to Uhlans to armored Cuirassiers. The uniforms of the American Civil War were patterned after the European models, which were more elaborate and colorful before the advent of drab colors in the 20th century. Many European regiments, especially among the cavalry, entered the First World War wearing uniforms identical to what they wore almost fifty years before.

In the U.S. the Franco-Prussian War is not nearly as popular for modelers as our American Civil War. Luckily, there are many kits available that are great subjects to paint. Poste Militaire's 70 and 75mm Franco-Prussian War series produced some exceptionally


fine figures, which were at the time some of the best figures available. I would go so far as to say they were the pinnacle of the figure maker's craft. Many of these can still be obtained at shows from reseller's or found online from sites such as eBay.

The older Poste Militaire metal castings are very desirable. However, if you can't find an original, FeR has re-released some of these in resin under their "Elite Classics" line. Sculpted by Stefano Cannone, the series' only mounted figure (shown here) depicts an officer halting the tragic and unnecessary advance of the 8th and 9th Cuiras-

siers through the town of Morsbronn during the same battle. 
Franco Prussian War series 3-pack

Now in English and Hardcover! "The Medieval Flat Figures of Hans Müeller, Erfurt"

by Richard L. Sanders, et al.

his updated, expanded and hardcover book, now in English, on Hans Mueller's medieval and Saracen/Ottoman flat figures is expected to be published in July 2021. People who pre-order it can have it mailed once printed or can pick it up at the Saturday 4 September 2021 Zinnfigurentag in Schmalkalden, if the event is held. Due to the high printing and mailing costs, the quantity of books published will be limited and scaled to the number of pre-orders.

Unfortunately the publisher cannot offer a discount for pre-ordering. The limited numbers being printed, maximum of 50 copies, and the hardcover binding necessitate a higher price than for the softcover earlier German edition. Furthermore, anticipated increases in postage rates in June from Germany to the USA and Canada increase the cost for shipping to those countries.

The book will be approximately 180 pages, DIN A4 ($8\frac{1}{4}$ x $11\frac{3}{4}$ in.), hardcover format, and contain over 600 illustrations including colour photos of all of Hans Mueller's medieval, Saracen and Ottoman figures that have been painted by 38 collectors from Germany, other European countries and the U.S. It also contains all of the additional, attachable flags for the 1410 Battle of Tannenberg/Grunwald that Mueller produced. All 460-plus figures are presented in their original 30mm scale or larger, many depicting both sides.

Additionally, the photo montages depicting all of the unpainted figures and the tables describing them, which appeared in the Nov 2019-Jun 2020 articles in the Die Zinnfigur magazine and in the German book have been updated and are now in English and contain other additional information. Many new photos of figures and images of the drawings that inspired them have been added.

The publication also has chapters written by Gernot Schlager, Henry Schmidt und Hans Schwahn – experts on the development of medieval armour and the Mueller figures. This book is a valuable reference work for every collector and provides a unique view of some of the most beautiful flats ever produced, and then painted by impressive artists.

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KIT INSPECTION

nother resin kit of a Roman subject from this manufacturer. This one is formed from 10 component parts. As is always the case with these large resin castings, there is an appreciable amount of casting lugs to have to remove. However, the only one that might give one a problem is at the rear of the helmet. Here the piece is quite thin, and some care will be required not to damage the casting. The component parts include the head, the rear of the helmet, both cheek guards the (ridiculously small) tie laces, the helmet crest, the body, the dagger (pugio) and two parts that took me a while to work out what they were and how they fitted in. These are on the figure's left side and form part of the cloak and some of the leather straps (pteryges) of the subarmilis - the leather undergarment. There is also a pedestal base for the figure, which I have not included in this list as its use can be considered to be optional.

There really are no problems with this kit. I, personally, prefer to paint the entire face

before adding the cheek guards, even though a good deal will be covered by them. It is also the case for the ceremonial dagger that it is easier to add after the body has been painted

Personally, I think that this bust is wrongly captioned. It is not like any of the helmets that I know of. Those reconned to be "Cavalry" helmets are very different to this "Attic" type. In fact, I know of only one helmet that might be an 'Attic' helmet that is intact – and this one may well be a forgery. Certainly, no such helmets are recorded in H. Russell-Robin's seminal work on Roman armour (which is mainly about helmets). There are numbers of examples of the frontage/brow guard of these helmets but in all cases the skull part (the largest part) is missing. To me, this looks more like what might be described

as a "senior officer's helmet", someone like a legatus legionis (the legion commander) or one of the tribunes (of which there were six in each legion). All these people were from the upper levels of Roman society and could well afford something like this. I have described mine as being the laticlavius (senior tribune) of the XV Apollinaris legion. We do know the names of around a dozen of the senior officers of this legion, so my chap is Arrius Proculus, who we know served in this legion between AD 137-140.

So, another excellent bust from Young Miniatures. Recommended. —MT



THE VIETNAM VETERAN'S MEMORIAL

On 6 May 1981, the Commission of Fine Arts unanimously chose Maya Yang Lin's simple and elegant design for the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial in the Constitution Gardens in Washington D.C. Lin's post minimalist design was of two black walls of granite that descend into a gravelike depression and meet at an angle. It was chosen from over 1100 submissions in an open call to artists by the Department of the Interior. The walls would be engraved with the names of

those who were killed in the line of duty during the war in chronological order, starting with Air Force T-Sgt. Richard B. Fitzgibbon Jr. who was murdered on 8 June 1956 by another airman as he was handing out candy to orphans in Saigon.

The choice, like the war, was controversial. Veteran's groups hated it and wanted something more akin to the Marine Corps War Memorial. Several compromises were proposed, but President Ronald Reagan called the Commission and told them to ignore the critics. One of the compromises, adding the "Three Servicemembers" to the Memorial, was eventually approved but only when it was placed far enough away that it wouldn't disrupt the integrity of Lin's creation.

Names are still being added as remains of those listed as "missing in action" are found, or those who died as a direct result of injuries sustained in the war. The last six names were added in 2010.




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
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BURGUNDIAN SERPENTINE AND SERVANT By Michel Brasseur



Serpentine of Charles the Bold (French: Charles-le-Téméraire) graphic from Wikipedia. It was a light cannon (barrel without trunnions, and fitted with an arc-shaped point) mounted on a wooden wheeled carriage. It was the first field artillery in the 15th century. Medium caliber bullets, made of iron or lead, are introduced through the mouth and fired with black powder.





This is a 30mm flat edited by Kieler, Zinnfiguren No. 1163a and 1163b, engraved by Hans Lecke, and painted in oils. Some 180 pieces of this early cannon were used by Charles the Bold during the battle of Grandson against the Swiss Confederates in 1476, and eventually taken by the Swiss force after a rout of the Burgundian army.

Historical background

At the end of the Middle Ages, Charles the Bold (who succeeded in 1467 from his father Philip the Good) as the head of the Duchy of Burgundy, signed in 1469 with Duke Sigismund of Austria the Treaty of Saint-Omer. In this treaty Charles received as a pledge territories in the Black Forest

and Upper Alsace, in exchange for its military protection. The Duke of Habsburg at odds with Louis XI, King of France, also feared the expansionist views of the neighboring Swiss Confederation, but did not have a solid army. Burgundy also wanted to strengthen its power and link its territories, which were quite dispersed.

The Swiss Confederation comprised eight cantons: Uri, Schwyz, Unterwald, Lucerne,

Zurich, Zug, Glarus, Bern (26 cantons today). It was a bundle of alliances between small sovereign states, to which were added allied countries, subject countries, and common bailiwicks. But, the Confederation remained fragile and was looking for external partners. In Bern, there was a pro-Burgundian party led by Adrien de Bubenberg, a personal friend of Duke Charles Le Bold, and a pro-French party, led by Nicolas de Diesbach, which eventually prevailed.

Bern saw its ambitions thwarted by the installation in Haute-Alsace of the Burgundian administration. Eager to push back this cumbersome neighbor, Bern arranged a compromise between the Confederation and the Duke of Austria by which the latter definitively renounced his possessions on the left bank of the Rhine, among others Aargau and Thurgau.

The King of France Louis XI then paid a large sum to the cantons for their armament in order to enable them to fight his arrogant Burgundian vassal.

The armies present

In the Burgundy army,

recruitment was largely open to foreign mercenaries, especially Italians who were all called Lombards. They made up about half of the workforce. Its cavalry was of the first order and one can think that it would easily overcome the Swiss. The artillery, the most modern of the time, was a sort of mobile fortress on the battlefield. It included some 300 pieces, not counting the arquebuses and the culverins.

As for the Confederates, they owed their success to the use of the halberd, and the pike, six meters in length, which proved effective against cavalry charges. The Swiss peasant soldiers were all the more feared because they did not practice war like the feudal knights or the Italian condottiere. They did not care to take prisoners and killed their enemies at all costs, regardless of the ransom they might get.

The Battle of Héricourt

On October 25, 1474, four days after their alliance with Louis XI, the Confederates declared war on Charles the Bold. But the latter, meanwhile, had the bad idea to respond to a call for help from the Bishop of Cologne and he engaged in the interminable siege of the city of Neuss, near Düsseldorf. He could not therefore go out to meet the Confederates, this "people of herdsmen" as he described them with contempt.

Without waiting for it, 18,000 Confederates accompanied by Austrian and Alsatian contingents marched against Franche-Comté. They surprise the Burgundians at Héricourt on November 23, 1474, inflicting on them at least 4,000 deaths.

On the return of spring, in April 1475, the Bernese set out for the countryside in the Pays de Vaud, then dependent on the Duchy of Savoy. Their brutality and looting

exceeded the standards of the time, which is saying a lot!

The Battle of Grandson

Determined to regain control, Charles the Bold finally threw himself into war in the fall of 1475. He invaded Lorraine and occupied Nancy on November 30, 1475 with the aim of reuniting his Burgundian and Flemish possessions in one piece. Then, in January 1476, he turned against the Swiss. With a large crew, with several tens of thousands of men and his whole house, his silver crockery, the archives of his chancellery and his treasure, he crossed the Jura via the snowcovered Col de Jougne, arrived in Orbe and hit the road of Neuchâtel.

The duke wanted to secure passage to Bern and Basel. On this axis, only one serious lock: Grandson, at the western end of Lake Neuchâtel. Charles stormed the city after an eight-day siege. On February 28, the defenders of the castle surrendered, throwing themselves upon the mercy of the conquerors. Charles, as the new master of the castle, had the garrison of not less than 400 men massacred, despite the promise to spare their lives.

The crime aroused the ire of the Confederates who, however, had little lesson in humanity to teach anyone! At the call of the Bernese, nearly 20,000 men gathered in Neuchâtel, headed for Grandson and, although outnumbered, attacked the fortified camp of the duke.

On March 2, 1476, the

battle began. Charles the Bold wanted to attract the attackers to the plain the better to crush them. To this end, he asked his vanguard to move. With incredible bad luck, his other army corps believed they were to retreat. It immediately became a stampede. The Burgundians abandon all their artillery and a fabulous booty on the spot.

The Battle of Morat

(Murten in German)

Charles the Bold refused to admit defeat. He reconstituted his army and headed for Morat, a former Savoyard possession occupied by Bern. He began the siege of the city on June 9 with 30,000 soldiers. But on June 22, the Confederates attacked the Burgundians. The clash between Swiss infantry and Burgundian cavalry was resolved in one hour and ended in five hours of terror during which the victorious Swiss massacred their prisoners in retaliation for the Grandson massacre.

The Battle of Nancy

Charles the Bold, therefore, turns away from the Swiss and in an emergency, sets out to reconquer the city of Nancy, taken over by the armies of the Duke of Lorraine, René II. In great numerical inferiority, Charles nevertheless engages in combat and dies in the fray on January 5, 1477. It is the end of Ducal Burgundy.

These wars of Burgundy (1474-1476) constituted a turning point in the history of Europe and that of Switzerland. They led to the fall of the Burgundian state and strengthened the French monarchy as well as the place of the Habsburgs in Europe. They also for some time made the Swiss Confederation a great European military power, whose pikemen were as feared as the English archers and the Turkish janissaries.






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




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
